Friend Tripp:--

Well Tripp it looks like the country has gone Democratic. Apparently the next Congress is going to be on about a 50 - 50 basis. I just saw in the paper that Fred Steiwer was leading for the Senate in Oregon but I found no other information bearing on Oregon politics. It is certainly gratifying to me to note that the Oregon Electorate has shown its intelligence by repudiating Stanfield. How about the Governor race and local politics?

Tripp the Nation is passing through a critical period. We cannot afford to pass the reins of Government over to the Democrats and this election should certainly be a handwriting on the wall for the Coolidge adherents. I voted for Coolidge because of loyalty to the Republican party and not because I felt that he was the man for the position. Mr. Coolidge in my estimation would make a good bank president. If the Republican party hopes to carry away the honors in 1928 it will have to nominate a man possessing a dynamic personality of the Rooseveltian type.
